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
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Letter to the Editor

Did you know? It's Illegal to Blow Yard Leaves into the Street

Many species of Oaks drop their leaves in early spring, and the big trees in Whispering Oaks can shed more than some homeowners can handle. But don't be tempted to rake them into the gutter—for you may well receive a citation from the City. That's because wet leaves clog sewers, foul the Edward Aquifer watershed, and create a hazard of slipperiness for both vehicles and pedestrians.

Some homeowners don't realize they can even be held liable for violations committed by the landscaping services they hire. So it's a good idea to remind workers to collect your leaves and dispose of them properly. Please note that the City will not pick up leaves in plastic bags.

What can you do with all those leaves?

- Bag them in paper lawn bags available at home stores or HEB.
 Up to 50 bags can be picked up at the curb, as long as the contents are only leaves and/or grass clippings. This one-time service in the spring can be arranged by calling 311.
- Rake them into the green organic cart provided for free by the city, so they can be recycled into free mulch later in the spring. Call 311 for information on that.
- If your green recycling bin can't accommodate the volume, many firms will haul them away for a modest fee. Or call the City Customer Service Center at 311 and request an additional green bin. There's no additional fee for the extra green bin or its regular collection by the City.
- Leave them on the lawn (mowing will let them decompose faster) or pile them into static compost piles for gardening use later.

On the other hand, if you see leaves being blown or raked into our streets, please call 311 and report the violation. It's actually the neighborly thing to do! And your report can be made anonymously.

Fraud!

These days, we seem to be almost overwhelmed with fraudulent communications, some by email, some by telephone, some at your door. Here are some simple ways to tell quickly if the communication is a scam:

Emails

- 1. If it's from another country and it offers you any money, it's a scam.
- 2. If the name on the email is of a friend or a relative, click on the name to see the return address. If it's not the same as the person's, it's a scam.
- 3. If it seems to be from a legitimate company, even if it has an official logo, click on the name to see the email address. If it's not clearly the company's, delete immediately. If still unsure, call the company before reacting to the email.
- 4. If a mysterious email asks you to open an attachment or a link, don't do it. Check the sender's email address. It's almost certainly illegitimate.
- 5. If it's from a friend or acquaintance claiming to be stranded and needing a bailout, it's a scam.

Phone Calls

- 1. If you are told that you are in any sort of trouble or that there is "suspicious activity" on your account, it's probably a scam. If you are asked for any personal information, it's definitely a scam. Never give personal information over the phone unless you initiate the conversation, as in making a purchase. Clearly, if you don't even have such an account, it's a scam, so just hang up; don't even explain.
- 2. If you get an urgent phone call from a stranger claiming to be calling on behalf of a relative, such as a grandchild, and told the person is in some sort of trouble and needs money right away, it's a scam.

Door-to-Door

If a person comes to your door and makes an offer to do work on your house at a superior price, it's probably a scam. Often, the person will start the work, demand payment in advance for materials, then disappear. It's always best to get a reference, especially a personal one.
